DAN RYAN ELECTED AS FIFTH **MEMBER OF CITY COUNCIL**

Dan Ryan will be Portland's new city commissioner, filling the unexpired term of Nick Fish, who died in January. Ryan is a former Portland school board member and CEO of All Hands Raised, an education non-profit.

Ryan received 51.17 percent of the votes cast in the Aug. 11 special election. Loretta Smith, a former Multnomah County commissioner, received 48.07 percent of the votes.

The election results will be certified Sept. 9, according to the council clerk's office.

DEADLINE APPROACHES FOR VOTER REGISTRATION

Oct. 13 is the deadline to register to vote in Oregon for the Nov. 3 general election. Multnomah County residents may register or check their registration status at www. multco.us/elections. Voters also may change their residence address, party affiliation or name. Those with a new name should also complete a new printed registration card so that the elections division has the new signature on record.

INTERSTATE BRIDGE REPAIRS TO SLOW TRAFFIC IN SEPTEMBER

Drivers heading into Washington on Interstate 5 may encounter heavy traffic between Sept. 12 and 20. The northbound span of the Interstate Bridge will be closed while crews replace mechanical parts that help lift and lower the bridge.

The southbound span will remain open to traffic in both directions. Nevertheless, regional agencies are urging drivers to find alternatives to using the bridge, if they can. C-Tran will put additional buses on



express routes during the project, the

transit agency said. The buses also will use the shoulder of southbound I-5 to bypass traffic in Clark County.

The Oregon Department of Transportation is the lead agency on the project. It has been working with other agencies to plan for the project, including the Washington State Department of Transportation and the City of Vancouver.

MEASURE 110 PROPOSES CHANGES IN DRUG TREATMENT

Oregonians will decide whether to approve a November ballot measure to develop a system for prevention, treatment and education rather than punishment for low-level drug possession.

Measure 110 would end jail time and criminal convictions for possession of small quantities of drugs, currently regarded as a misdemeanor. Instead, police would issue citations with a \$100 fine that would be waived if those cited are evaluated at an addiction recovery center. No drug would be legalized.

The Drug Policy Alliance, a New Yorkbased nonprofit that states it supports treatment alternatives supported by science, compassion and health, helped develop the ballot measure with the aim of eliminating the problems that drug convictions bring for jobs, housing and finances.

Others involved in treating substance abuse have raised questions about how the proposed program would operate effectively.

Funding for the proposed program would come from a portion of the state's current marijuana tax revenue. It would pay for treatment, peer support, recovery services and housing, according to supporters. They include Mental Health & Addiction Association of Oregon and Outside In, a nonprofit working with homeless youth.

MADISON ALUMS SEEK FUNDS FOR FIELD HOUSE

The Madison Alumni Association is seeking donations totaling \$150,000 to build an athletic field house to enhance coaching and teaching for the high school's students. It also would be open to the Northeast sports community.

Construction would begin in the fall of 2021, after the school at 2735 N.E. 82nd Ave. is scheduled to reopen following modernization work. The field house is expected to be available by the spring of 2022.

The non-profit alumni association's plan is to construct a 50-by-100-foot, barn style building with turf and heat for all-weather use. All donors' names would be displayed.





The blowing of the Shofar, a ram's horn, is the central observance of the Jewish new year on Rosh Hashana. To help people mark the holiday safely during the pandemic, Chabad of Northeast Portland has arranged a safe and family-friendly observance for small groups on Sept. 20.

The blast of the horn has been likened to a spiritual wake-up call, a declaration of freedom, and a signal of renewal, said Rabbi Chaim Wilhelm, director of Chabad of Northeast Portland.

"We are looking forward to an uplifting event, when community members can come together to be inspired as we enter the New Year with hope and faith," Wilhelm said.

HOMELESS TO LIVE IN THREE MOTELS

Portland's and Multnomah County's Joint Office of Homeless Services is working with nonprofit agencies to open rooms at three motels for people in homeless shelters who are most likely to suffer serious illness or death from COVID-19.

One agency, Transition Projects, has moved high-risk adults to the Banfield Value Inn at 1525 N.E. 37th Ave. in the Grant Park neighborhood. Do Good Multnomah has moved adults into a Motel 6 and a Days Inn in other Metro neighborhoods.

The city-county office leases the rooms and pays the agencies to manage the sites. The office also is working with culturally specific service providers, including Urban League of Portland.

DRESS FOR SUCCESS NAMES INTERIM HEAD

Dress for Success Oregon has a new interim executive director, Grayson Dempsey, an advocate for reproductive freedom and women's rights since 1999.

Dress for Success, at 1532 N.E. 37th Ave. in Hollywood, helps women achieve economic independence with a network of support services and a professional wardrobe. During the COVID pandemic, the organization isn't accepting clothing donations and many of its programs are moving online.

Dempsey most recently served as executive director of NARAL Pro-Choice Oregon. She was a founder of Backline, now called All-Options, an organization that supports all aspects of pregnancy, parenting and adoption.

"I look forward to leading this important organization as they rise to meet this critical moment, ensuring that women have the resources and opportunities they need to advance and thrive," said Dempsey.

KAISER GIVES FUNDS FOR NE VILLAGE PDX

Kaiser Permanente has donated \$10,000 to support Northeast Village PDX, one of 11 'villages' that help residents age in place in their own homes. Trained volunteers provide support services, rides, light housework, yard work and friendly calls and visits for older neighbors.

Kaiser sees the Village NW model as a way to provide a holistic alternative to retirement communities and assisted care.

HEALTH CARE CLASSES GO ONLINE AT SUMNER

Sumner College, which offers certificates and degrees for medical assistants, practical nurses and registered nurses, has moved many of its classes online.

CITY APPROVES RIP, STATE-MANDATED CHANGES WILL BE IMPLEMENTED FIRST

On August 12, city council's three-toone approval of strategies to build density in urban neighborhoods gave the green light to the most comprehensive rewrite of Portland's zoning code since 1991. The lone dissenting vote came from Amanda Fritz, who does not favor demolitions of older, single-family homes.

The first-of-its-kind policy opens residential neighborhoods to multifamily development on most lots and brings the city into compliance with Oregon Senate Bill 534.

As the final piece of the planning bureau's housing strategy, the Residential Infill Project complements a previous mixed-use zone update and the subsequent implementation of multifamily zones. For more information, visit www.portland.gov/bps/rip.

HOLLYWOOD TRANSIT CENTER WILL ADD 120 UNITS OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING

TriMet and Bridge Housing are collaborating to transform what has been a spacious transit center for more than three decades into a compact mix of affordable and market-rate apartments in a new multistory complex. Community comments on the project will be gathered until fall.


"We have already reached out to and virtually briefed local groups such as the Hollywood Neighborhood Association, Hollywood Boosters and Central Northeast Neighbors Coalition and are also reaching out to communities of color, city staff and elected officials," said Bridge Vice-President Lyn Hikida.

Hikida said community meetings would continue until construction is expected to begin in winter of 2022. Phase one of the project envisions up to 120 permanently affordable apartments. Phase two is still to be determined, but may deliver between 60 and 100 additional housing units, or up to 80,000 square-feet of office space. A decision on Phase Two is not anticipated until predevelopment for phase one is complete.

STREET CLOSURE RESULTS IN BUSINESS SPIKE FOR KERNS NEIGHBORHOOD PUB

This summer's closure to cars of Southeast Ankeny Street between 27th and 28th avenues has resulted in a significant business boost for Gorges

"We were very far below our 2019 numbers – down about 80 to 90 percent – before our reopen in mid-June, so I estimate sales in July were about 50 percent higher than they were in July of 2019," said Owner Travis Preece. "Because the street was closed to vehicular traffic, our pub was able to utilize the street to safely serve socially-distanced customers."

Preece said the Ankeny Street closure was a success for all businesses on the block.

"The result was a welcoming outdoor environment where guests feel safe and, for a time, can feel a sense of normalcy," said Preece.

The street closure gave Preece's business enough capital to survive through the winter.

"A team of neighbors and business owners is working to open up all of Southeast 28th Avenue until November to help more than 15 more local businesses," said Preece.

NAYA CLEARED TO BUILD 56 AFFORDABLE HOUSING UNITS IN CULLY NEIGHBORHOOD

NAYA, the Native American Youth Association, has secured permits to build a new, four-story apartment building on the former parking lot of the shuttered Delphina's Bakery at 4610 N.E. 42nd Ave. in Cully.

Dubbed "Mamook Tokatee," the new complex will use tribal funding to reserve 20 of 56 total units for Native tenants, prioritizing Siletz tribal members and artists. Siletz tribal members will also get first option on the remaining 36 units. The former bakery will be renovated into an arts center.

According to a 2019 Multnomah County report, 11.6 percent of our homeless people are Native American, while Native Americans comprise only 2.5 percent of the county's total population. For more information, visit www.multco.us.

projects in Hollywood and Rose City Park Construction and permitting slowdowns have forced delays in projects for the Sandy 51 Apartments at 2351 N.E. 51st Ave. in Rose City Park and a new Target store at 4030 N.E. Halsey St. in Hollywood.

"Construction guidelines have changed to implement social distancing, mask wearing and increased hand washing to protect the health of contractors," said Stephanie Hosmar, Sandy 51 spokesperson. "Local municipal shutdowns and deferrals have caused some delay in our schedules."

Hosmar predicted the Sandy 51 project would meet its end of 2020 completion date and all 81 units would be ready to receive tenants by early 2021.

Mechanical, electrical and plumbing permits have finally been issued for the renovation of the former Hollywood Bowl site into a new Target store with a CVS Pharmacy onsite. Planning for the new facility began a year ago.

"As external circumstances continue to evolve, there will naturally be some delays and shifts," said Taget Spokesperson Jill Lewis. "As we get closer to opening the Hollywood store, we'll have more specific details to share."

In Boise at 210 N. Failing St., Michael Kirk of Southwest Portland has proposed building a new, three-story, singlefamily home with an attached garage.

At 3575 N.E. Holman St., Brandy and Adiam Mehretab have asked for permission to demolish a 960-squarefoot, single-family residence and replace it with a new, three-story, singlefamily home with an attached garage.

In Kenton at 1603 N. Willis Blvd., Willis Apartments of Southwest Portland has applied for permission to build a new, four-story, 44-unit apartment building with a basement. A permit was issued in March to deconstruct the 2070-square-

foot, single-family residence that as built in 1922. t 8923 N. Drummond Ave., FX Homes of Sandy, has applied for permission to build a new, two-story, single family residence with an attached single-

vehicle garage on property where a 1032-square-foot, single-family home

has stood since 1955.

In Kerns at 2214 N.E. Flanders St., Dwell Development and Oleg Lupekha have filed applications to construct six new, two-story attached townhomes with no garages on a single lot where a 974-square-foot, single-family residence has stood since 1923.

In Overlook at 1921 N. Killingsworth St., RWC and Ron Wagner of Southwest Portland have applied to deconstruct a 2500-square-foot retail facility built in 1909. Plans are also under review to build a new, four-story, 18-unit, mixed-use building with retail on the ground floor.

Art shows embrace themes of change, perseverance

Artwork shows how people respond to change. It shows how they persevere during a pandemic. It reveals how some people turn to nature for color, form and the spirit of living things.

Three locally produced art shows embrace these themes of change, perseverance and solace in nature. However, the exhibits aren't in open galleries like pre-COVID days. All three exhibits are online and two are open to visitors wearing masks and keeping social distance.

The "Engage in the Change" exhibit grew out of a discussion in January about neighborhood changes, especially in Concordia, said Jordana Leeb, an organizer of the community meeting and art show. The reasons for change are complex, Leeb said, and changes have occurred in the neighborhood and throughout the city.

"Being of an artistic mind myself," she said. "I thought art would be a way to process change." Originally, she expected people to consider new aspects of community, housing and relations with others. Then, the pandemic and demonstrations following George Floyd's death occurred. Those events brought more ways to consider change, she said.

exhibit also includes historic photos, including one from 1931when Louis Ciarlo stood in front of his father's shoe repair shop at 2215 N.E. Alberta St.

Poetry and writings are also on display. One called "Change" by Avery reads, "It has not been easy / with all the challenges we have been facing / But we are there for each other."

The show is available on Facebook and will be at the Alberta Street Gallery, 1829 N.E. Alberta St., through Sept. 19. The hours are 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily. Masks and social distancing are required.

"The Art of Perseverance" is the title of a show on Vimeo from Sept. 4 to Oct. 4, arranged by Elise Wagner, an artist and teacher of encaustic painting. The ancient

medium is sometimes called hot wax painting, with pigment added to heated beeswax and applied to wood, canvas or other surfaces.

The show also features work in a variety of media, including sculpture, paintings and digital art. Submissions came from artists all over the U.S. and several other countries. The Vimeo link is https://vimeo.com/elisewagnerfineart/art-of-perseverance-2020.

During the COVID pandemic, Wagner likes to ask, "How are you persevering?" instead of the usual polite greeting "How are you?" and the emails she's received from submitting artists illuminate that idea.

One artist has multiple challenges because of his premature birth. He can't hold a paint brush, but he can do digital art.

"This exemplifies perseverance," Wagner said.

At the Guardino Gallery, 2939 N.E. Alberta St., three artists who gain inspiration from nature are showing work until Sept. 20. Images can be viewed at www.guardinogallery.com and visitors may visit the gallery during business hours with masks and social distancing.

Kathleen Powers' acrylics include skunks, mice and opossums, which often are regarded as pests.

"They are important components of our ecosystem – living as intelligent, highly adaptable survivors and protective parents to their young. I do not think they get the credit or spotlight they deserve," her artist's statement says.

Fran Lee is showing etchings made from copper plates. She creates over-size animals – bunnies, squirrels, bears – with some holding babies. Other animals hold a female figure.


In her artist's statement, Lee says she endeavors to give her creatures visual respect. She sees subtle narratives in nature and her eye is drawn to the "spirit of living things, animal life, wild and tame."

Hsin-Yi Huang is a ceramic artist who works predominately in porcelain. The show features her "Flowers," where she explores forms and patterns found in nature. Her rose blossoms are brightly colored, while a plum blossom and seed pod have subtle colors.

Huang says she spends time in nature for joy and calm. "She wishes her work will also bring a feeling of peacefulness to her viewers during this time of uncertainty," her statement says.

After having to cancel its 23rd annual Neil Kelly scholarship luncheon, Albina Rotary Club honored the 2020 cohort at a smaller, private gathering.

She volunteers with groups serving marginalized women, educates peers in social justice and will study public health at the University of Oregon or Oregon State.

Carballo-Rodriquez captained her volleyball team and served as Roosevelt's student body president and climate
