REGISTER TO VOTE BEFORE OCTOBER 13 TO GET BALLOT

October 13 is the last day to register for the November 3 general election. Registration may be arranged at www. mcelections.org. Voters who need to re-register because of a new address or change of name also may use the form provided at the website.

If you have changed your name, be sure to sign a new card so that elections workers can compare the signature on the ballot with the signature on the file card. When voting, make sure your ballot is in the official mailing envelope and that you have signed the back of that envelope on the correct line.

The Multnomah County Elections Division will begin mailing ballots to registered voters on October 14. Elections officials advise that October 27 is the last day to safely return ballots by mail. In Oregon, ballots must be at the elections office by 8 p.m. November 3. Postmarks don't count in Oregon.

Voters may sign up to track their ballots at mcelections.org. Information also is available from the county elections office at 503-988-VOTE (8583). Information for those displaced by wildfires is available from the secretary of state at www.sos.oregon.gov.

Ballots too late to be mailed may be dropped at the elections division building, 1040 S.E. Morrison St. A 24-hour drop box slot for walkers/bikers can be found on the north side of the building. A drive-up drop box is on the east side and another box is on the north side.

Ballots also may be deposited at 24hour book drop slots in Multnomah County libraries, where they will be picked up on a regular schedule. The

NECN VIDEO GIVES FACTS ABOUT HOMELESSNESS

If you think most of the city's homeless people live on the street or under blue tarps clustered near highways or walkways, you aren't grasping the problem, according to agencies working with the homeless.

To help provide information about the city's homeless issue, the Northeast Coalition of Neighborhoods has created a video titled "What Do We Mean When We Talk about Homelessness?" The video was shown at the September meeting of the Interfaith Alliance on Poverty, a five-year-old coalition of 14 faith congregations.

The video notes that most homeless people aren't addicts and most aren't downtown or under those Eastside tarps. Most live in cars, motels or in friends' homes. Their kids go to local schools.

They aren't lazy and they don't choose to be homeless. However, they don't have incomes high enough to pay Portland's



rising housing costs, which are among the highest in the country. Most homeless people are from the metro area. Only 11 percent come from elsewhere in the country.

Dozens of agencies are working on the issue, the video says. The problems remain, it continues, "but that's not a sign no one is doing anything. It's a sign of how big the problem is."

Groups working on homeless issues include the city and Multnomah County's Joint Office of Homeless Services, Transition Projects, Portland Homeless Family Solutions, plus shelters and other agencies.

NORTHEAST FOOD PROGRAM NEEDS MORE VOLUNTEERS





The Bureau of Transportation and Lyft have added a new fleet of pedal-assisted electric bikes to Biketown. With the support of title sponsor Nike, the Biketown service area has grown to 32 square miles with its first expansion into East Portland.

This includes the Jade District, in the vicinity of Southeast 82nd Avenue and Division Street, and portions of Lents, Powellhurst-Gilbert and the Gateway area.

The 500 new e-bikes, bright orange like the rest of the fleet, are expected to grow to 1500, according to the bureau. Riders may rent e-bikes through the Lyft app or a new Biketown app. When a rider pedals, the e-bikes use a small electric motor to boost the rider's pedal power, making longer trips easier. Riders find tips for using the e-bikes when they log in to the new app.


RESET FITNESS HABITS WITH NEW PROGRAM

STREET ART ENHANCES GRANT PARK EYESORE

The Aircraft Factory building at the southeast corner of Northeast Broadway and 33rd Avenue in the Grant Park neighborhood is looking a little better, following an application of street art sponsored by the Portland Street Art Alliance.

"The upgrade in curb appeal came about in part because of a donation from the building owners and in part by volunteers organized by the Alliance," said Tiffany Conklin, executive director of the alliance. "The hope is to discourage further vandalism and provide a canvas for local artists to make interesting art."


Conklin said the building was originally a production site for World War I floatplane wings. The owners of the building, Aircraft Factory LLC of Spokane, plan to restore the building and nominate it for the National Register of Historic Places. The structure had been the home of Gordon Fireplace Shop and Home Furnishings for many years.

"As with all large projects, especially those of historic nature, the restoration process requires complex coordination of government, financial and construction entities. Developers are working through design and construction plans, hoping to break ground once all moving parts are aligned," said Conklin.

CHURCH VISION DRIVES AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROJECT IN THE GULCH

Grace Memorial Episcopal Church Rector Martin Elfert's vision for a parking lot west of church buildings at 1535 N.E. 17th Ave. in Sullivan's Gulch had to answer the question: How can we be the best possible stewards of our resources to mutually benefit our church and our community?

On the job for five years now, Elfert

said his vision was at first modest and simple but has since blossomed into the idea – not without some risk – of developing a space that will serve the poor, the developmentally disabled and the arts with equal dignity.

Engaging a coalition of long-time collaborators like Grace Art Camps and PHAME PDX, Elfert enlisted the talents of Northwest Housing Alternatives to develop a concept that will soon move into its fundraising stage.

Grace Art Camps provides creative arts experiences for over 1250 children annually and PHAME PDX creates performance opportunities for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The team's proposal will include the construction of nearly 100 units of affordable housing on the upper floors of a six-story building, with about 24,000 square feet of office, church and classroom space on the ground floor. The L-shaped structure will be completely accessible. The church building, built in 1927, will remain as is.

Jenny Stadler, executive director of PHAME PDX for the past three years, is an eager participant and avid cheerleader for the project.





"PHAME is booming by leaps and bounds, and we need more space," she said. "I'm especially enthused about a new, accessible performance theater that will serve the entire arts community."

Stadler said there is a huge lack of accessible performance and rehearsal space in the city.

"We've found in the church, landlords who are friends and who understand the equity and inclusiveness of our community," she said. "As we grow and thrive, our organization will reach out to others in the community to help with the fundraising."

Rector Elfert characterized the project as "... the right people descending from heaven on a cloud to move the concept out of fantasy mode."

After conversations with Walsh Construction, Carleton Hart Architecture and capital campaign consultants, the church selected Northwest Housing Alternatives as its developer for the project.

Destin Ferdun, Northwest's director of real estate development, said the regional agency "... is super-thrilled to come aboard."

The development team is eyeing the fall of 2023 as a possible completion date for the project and has proposed to the city that a short portion of Northeast 16th Avenue between Weidler and Halsey streets be vacated. Tentative schedules call for Grace Arts Camps to be moved off-site for 16 months during construction.

"The main task now is getting the capital campaign back on schedule," said Elfert.

CONSTRUCTION OF 28 APARTMENTS GETS GOING IN ROSE CITY PARK

Grove Development of Beaverton began excavation in September on part of a property where two, single-family homes built in 1925 and 1927 were razed in August.

Houses once owned by the same family at 3450 N.E. 50th Ave. and 5024 N.E. Fremont St. previously book-ended an empty lot used for annual Christmas trees sales.

The city has approved the project to build two, three-story apartment structures, connected with stairs and balcony on the corner of Northeast 50th Avenue and Fremont Street. One building will have six units and the other will have 12. By mid-September, footings for one building were complete and forms for a second building were being built.

On the property to the east, Fremont Street Project of Tualatin has plans under review for a third, three-story building proposed to be mixed-use with ground-floor retail space and 10 apartments on upper floors.

MONTAVILLA PICNIC SHELTER CONSTRUCTION ON HOLD

Originally slated to begin in the fall, construction on a new picnic structure in Montavilla Park has now been placed on a "to be determined" schedule. The old wading pool in the park will also be razed.

"The wading pool has to be removed because it does not conform to state regulations which went into effect some years back," said Mark Ross, Parks and Recreation spokesman

The picnic structure has been fenced and is slated for demolition.

In Kenton at 2010 N. Farragut St., Hayes Enterprises of Southwest Portland has been permitted to build a new, threestory single-family residence with an attached accessory dwelling unit and no garage on a vacant lot.

In Kerns at 2214 N.E. Flanders St., Dwell Development and Oleg Lupekha secured a permit to deconstruct a 974-square-foot, single-family residence built in 1924. Plans are under review to build three, new, two-story, attached townhomes with no garages.

Birds can be intelligent and highly social pets

In July of 2016, as a result of an abuse investigation, the Oregon Humane Society rescued 245 exotic birds. After the birds were rehabilitated, all 245 birds were adopted in record time. Birds are long-lived. (Amazon Parrots can live as long as 75 years.) They are intelligent, colorful, easily trained and highly social.

If you think your family might be a match for an exotic bird, you can begin your research at Exotic Bird Rescue of Oregon. The nonprofit organization strives to promote exotic bird ownership through the rescue and re-homing of birds that have been surrendered to them. They have a wide variety of birds, from small to grand, residing in foster homes and ready for adoption.

Board Chair Kathy Vos loves her birds and their crazy personalities. Her cockatoos are very smart. They can dance and talk. One can disassemble his cage and will then go on to free her other birds.

"These birds are smart and need mental stimulation, like toys and shreddable

objects to stay healthy and avoid behavioral issues" Vos said. "Leaving a smart bird alone all day in a room is neglectful. They need companionship and a buddy bird is recommended."

Some species, like cockatoos, can be demanding.

A healthy diet is critical. Nutritional

foods, such as specifically-formulated pellets, lots of low-starch vegetables and minimal fruit are necessary. A seed-only diet is inadequate and can result in serious medical issues.

One of the greatest dangers to kept birds is toxic odors from items that we use every day. Using Teflon or silicone when cooking will emit fumes that can kill birds immediately. Another danger is various cleaning fluids, scented candles and air fresheners.

Exotic birds are companionable, colorful and make wonderful pets for families who are ready to cope with their unique personalities and needs. If you think an exotic bird is in your future, more information can be found at the Exotic Bird Rescue of Oregon website: www. rescuebird.com. All potential adopters will need to take the organization's online bird-care classes. Even those who currently have birds can learn new information by taking these free classes.

Rose City Futsal team responds to wildfire crisis

Carlee Brounstein and the 75 full- and part-time employees of Rose City Futsal have experienced challenging times since mid-March when COVID-19 caused their furlough. So their hearts went out to fellow Oregonians challenged by the devastation of September's wildfires.

Led by general manager Brounstein, several employees volunteered to collect, sort, pack and send in excess of 60,000 new and gently-used items to wildfire evacuees.

They were joined by more volunteers – to total about 50 during the full week of the project – who devoted two 12-hour days to collect items and five to pack and ship them.

"I have to do something," Brounstein told her boss Kevin Murphy, one of Futsal's owners and its managing director. "He said 'Absolutely.'"

She wasn't surprised at Murphy's response. "Even though we're not a nonprofit, we do incredible work in the community. We host fundraisers pretty consistently."

In fact, at least four fundraisers are organized at the business annually, and employees select the beneficiaries.

The September collection event was important to Brounstein. For one thing, her hometown is Phoenix, Oregon, where the Alameda Drive fire left a wide swath of ashes, along with the neighboring city of Talent. Her family was evacuated and the fire came within a few blocks of their home.

"It's our responsibility as Oregonians to help each other," she said.

Brounstein and a core of the employees announced collection plans on social media and emailed the company's database. They used the Rose City Futsal building and parking lot, bordered by I-84 on northeast Oregon Street.

No financial donations were requested because, "It's a tremendously hard time for people right now," she said.

Little did anyone expect the fires that prompted the collection effort would make it difficult on September 13 and 14. That's when Portland was to have the worst air quality among 50 major cities across the globe.

Volunteers who unloaded donations from cars, vans and pick-ups wore N95 masks or filtered ones and rotated between outdoor and indoor duties.

"People really showed up – family, our players, children and neighborhood folks," Brounstein said. "Everybody was feeling incredibly helpless. That's what spurred the event in the first place and it allowed people to have an outlet to be helpful."

Brounstein admitted to tearing up. Three generations of employees, friends, families and other volunteers pitched in.

"Seeing people so happy to be able to do something ... it was an outpouring of

love for our community," she said. "We really need that right now. It has not only been an incredible team effort, it's been like a family affair. It's been neat to be near people who care so much."

Response to the supply drive not only surprised the general manager and others. It overwhelmed them.

"To say we were inundated doesn't quite cover it," she said.

Nearly three hours into the first day's four-hour collection, she and her team had to begin turning away donations of clothing and bedding. That was necessary to balance the capacity of the Futsal building and volunteers with the needs of the shelters.

"We simply could not continue to prioritize them over items evacuees needed more," she said. So collections were then limited to masks, hygiene and cleaning products, camping gear, water and nonperishable foods, baby items, and supplies for animals.

Just as contributors and volunteers showed up in droves, so did opportunities to transport the items to evacuees in shelters.

Brounstein had planned to crowdsource funds to rent trucks for delivering the items. However, Mason Evans, another of Rose City Futsal's owners, provided trucks and drivers from his construction company, JH Kelley.

By the time the final load left Portland on September 19, Brounstein was tired but gratified. Would she ever spearhead an effort like this again?

"I wouldn't hesitate," she said.





New plants rooted at McCoy memorial on MLK

Fall into winter is planting time in local gardens, and the Gladys McCoy Memorial, on Northeast Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard at Knott Street, is among the sites that will have new plants to produce greenery and blooms in warmer seasons.

In addition, a crew from Mossy Tree Care will remove storm damage and trim limbs, shrubs and a hedge at the memorial for the first Black woman elected to public office in Oregon.

A team of volunteers has been rejuvenating the memorial oasis since summer when Kate Thompson, a retired nurse, took a close look at the low brick wall with a memorial plaque at the back of the garden.

She gathered volunteers, dubbed Gladys' Garden Gnomes, to remove most of the weeds, although some remain. Employees of the Nike Community Store across the street also form weekend crews to do clean-up work.

Thompson called for an estimate on tree trimming from Mossy Tree Care, which has done work in her own yard on Northeast 11th Avenue. When owners James Unger and Andy Brown learned about the community interest in the memorial garden, they decided to donate their work.

In October, Mossy arborists expect to remove a big limb torn from a sweet gum tree in an early September wind storm. Tall dogwoods, with red fruit that attracts birds, will be trimmed. The hedge at the back of the garden will be reshaped.

'We can make some corrective cuts,"

Noah Taylor, a Mossy employee, said of the hedge as he made notes of the work to be done. A goal will be to encourage better growth of the hedge growing behind the wall's memorial plaque.

The tree company also will cut back a line of laurel shrubs that have volunteered at the front of the garden, beside the sidewalk. The "gnomes" continue weeding. Tamara Boyd and Jeff Strang dug up masses of quack grass, an invasive plant that sends roots deep into the soil.

John Barker, a retired architect with a passion for gardening, is another gnome who reshaped the rose bushes planted

about 25 years ago. Barker is working with a local nursery to select drought-tolerant plants that will bring new color to the garden in the spring and summer. He hopes to start planting in coming months.

Leonna Hardiway, the manager of the Nike store, told Thompson in an email why her crew members - most of them from the neighborhood - joined in the garden work.

'You only have to be human to see the love, appreciation and respect Gladys has within this community," she said.

Mary McCoy, one of the children of Gladys and Bill McCoy – Bill McCoy was the first Black man elected to the state legislature – also sent Thompson an email.

"On behalf of the McCoy family, we thank you, Jeff Strang, Tamara Boyd and John Barker (aka Gladys' Garden Gnomes) for your thoughtfulness in beautifying our mother's memorial," she said.

Thompson took her first close look at the memorial garden after the May death of George Floyd in Minneapolis. For many years she had walked by the garden on her three-mile walk to work at Good Samaritan Hospital. After she followed the curving walkway into the garden and read the plaque listing Gladys McCoy's achievements, Thompson saw a project to undertake. She didn't feel inclined to join the downtown marches for equity and justice. Instead, as an experienced gardener, she felt better suited to

rejuvenating the memorial to Oregon's first Black elected official.

Gladys McCoy was elected to the Portland Public Schools board in 1970. She went on to become the state's first ombudsman in 1976. She served as a Multnomah County commissioner from 1979-1984. In 1987 she was elected county chair, serving until 1993 when she died of thyroid cancer.

The memorial garden was a project of Venable Booker, a McCoy friend. In 1969, Booker started the American State Bank, one of the first Black-owned banks in the Northwest. The bank was on the property next to the memorial.

Booker died in 2005 and a family company retained the memorial property after selling the former bank building and land. Thompson contacted the family's lawyer, who expressed approval for neighbors to begin caring for the memorial.





Artistic Portland Gallery - an art cooperative with 25 member owners - has opened a new gallery space at 4110 N.E. Fremont St. in the Beaumont neighborhood's Dutch Village building. The space had previously been home to Liz Page's Amenity Shoes.

"We opened August 1 and our grand opening week will be October 8 through 11," said Marketing Coordinator Jen Cook-Chrysos. "We will have prizes, art giveaways and activities. Artistic Portland began in 2013 in a member's kitchen. It was composed of local artists who wanted to have a retail shop to sell their art. We love the neighborhood and are looking forward to becoming part of the community."




