



# PUBLIC ENGAGED TO FIND FUNDS FOR INFRASTRUCTURE

Portland Parks & Recreation and Portland Fire & Rescue are contending with similar challenges while continuing to provide services to meet community needs and maintaining the public infrastructure that supports all Portlanders.

Currently, both the Parks and Fire bureaus are struggling to manage failing public infrastructure that needs to be improved or replaced.

Consequently, both bureaus are working together to evaluate funding options for programs and infrastructure essential to a safe and revitalized city, an effort to support ongoing services, address service gaps, and repair or replace failing facilities after Commissioners Dan Ryan and Rene Gonzalez directed their bureaus to work together on community engagement to learn more about how best to invest in Portland's parks and recreation and fire and rescue services.

"Portland parks are where we play and seek

refuge in beauty; we must protect these assets for generations to come," Ryan said. "We also know Portlanders are experiencing significant tax burdens, so we need to balance existing taxes with new bond measures. Portlanders must have their voices heard in what services they want and how they want their public resources invested."

In November, the bureaus commissioned a poll of likely voters for the November 2024 election, and the poll found 70% satisfied with the Fire Bureau's quality of services and 75% satisfied with the Parks Bureau's. Additionally, most community members said they visit a park or recreation center at least weekly.

There was strong support for a bond when facility repairs and improvements were proposed for both Portland Parks & Recreation and Fire & Rescue together.

Top priorities from potential voters included fire emergencies and urban wildfire response; maintaining water quality in local rivers and streams; protecting parks and natural areas; planting and maintaining trees; providing free and low-cost recreation programs for kids, families and seniors; and repairing and restoring parks and recreation facilities.

Highest support was for a renewal of the Parks Five-Year Local Option Levy continuing to preserve parks, recreation, nature, water and improve safety.

# NORTHEAST 42ND/COLUMBIA IMPROVEMENTS UNDERWAY

The Portland Bureau of Transportation began construction in late January to install a new traffic signal, ADA curb ramps, crosswalks, sidewalks, street lighting and trees to the intersection of Northeast 42nd Avenue



work to improve roads, sidewalks and intersections is underway. The yearlong project will see a new traffic signal installed at Northeast 42nd Avenue and Columbia Boulevard and other improvements. requiring lane restrictions on the boulevard throughout 2024. (PBOT)

and Columbia Boulevard.

As part of the first phase of the 46th and Bryant Local Improvement District, the Bureau advised Portlanders to expect lane reductions on Northeast Columbia Boulevard. One lane in each direction will serve travelers on the Boulevard near 42nd Avenue during the approximately yearlong project. A temporary walkway will serve pedestrians, and flaggers will assist with accessing the avenue north of Columbia Boulevard.

Concrete will be used to rebuild the intersection instead of asphalt with the objective to improve durability and reduce long-term maintenance for the transit-heavy corridor. The contractor will reopen lanes on Northeast Columbia Boulevard as soon as it is safe to do so. The work is weather-dependent,

and the schedule may change.





or those looking to celebrate Valentine's Day with significant others, festive breakfasts with heartshaped waffles come to mind, as do token gifts and, of course, exchanging cards. Roses on the breakfast tray are another gift-offondness go-to. at 4727 N.E. Fremont St. or Garden Fever at 3433 N.E. 24th Ave.


"A plant is something that's beautiful and living that can last a long time," Garden Fever co-owner Tim O'Neal said. "It's not just an object."

Plant types that are tolerant and forgiving of not enough (or too much) light and water, are especially good choices as gifts. O'Neal invites consideration of air ferns, for example. As inferred from their name, their requirements are simple, including that they don't need soil, much less skill or intuition.

As with any holiday that includes gifts, Valentine's Day is for choosing something that will be meaningful to both give and receive. With plants, there is the added benefit of a gift that will be around beyond February.

# Recent storm brings some unexpected winter magic

ike On A Bike traded in his two wheels for a pair of skate blades last month as a severe ice storm brought Northeast Portland to a standstill. A native hockey-playing Canadian, I

couldn't resist the call of the icy streets in our neighborhood. I had only seen such perfect skating roads once before here in Portland, so with no hesitation, I dug out my hockey stick and a puck, laced on the skates and in minutes was weaving through the seemingly neverending Alameda ice rink.

The streets were almost deserted, but for two little ones laughing and sliding on saucers down

their frozen driveway and two men out for a walk (slide?). I was the lone skater.

During my skate, I noticed an intriguing snow sculpture by the sidewalk. On closer inspection, I recognized it as an icy version of an inukshuk, the kind the Indigenous people near the Arctic Circle used to build out of rock. I shook my head and smiled as I glided away.

A few blocks later, I saw a miniature version of the same sculpture and then two more, all sitting on the lower steps of homes. The structures were built with chunks of the frozen surface of the recent snow that was crusted from the freezing rain that followed.

I was fortunate to see a woman clearing her path at one of the homes. "What's up with the inukshuks?" I asked. "The what?" her reply. "Oh, you mean this little guy. We have no idea, he just appeared as if by magic today."

When I explained that I had seen at least five others, dotted around the neighborhood on my morning skate, she smiled, "So there is still magic in snowstorms. Tell me more about, what did you call them? Inukshuks?"

I explained about the Canadian history of these sentinels. The word "inukshuk" means "in the likeness of a human."

For generations, Inuit have created impressive stone markers on the vast Arctic landscape. Inukshuks serve several functions, including guiding travelers, warning of danger and marking places of reverence.

On my route back home, I stopped at one of the creations and placed my hockey stick next to it. with the puck on one arm, and snapped this photo. "That's my column for the month." I thought as I skated home.

After only a year in business, Johnson's store was so popular he was already outgrowing the space. He started looking to expand when he found the current location on Sandy Boulevard. He eventually closed the Gateway location and has been on Sandy for more than 17 years.

"I was actually going to just use it for storage and have a small shop at the front, but people from the neighborhood kept coming in," he says.

Inside you'll find new and rare comics, kids' books, collectibles, graphic novels and more. It also often plays host to guest artists and illustrators and workshops.

"We're always running out of room on the shelves," Johnson says. "Our books are like grains of sand — we have so many of them, but we always want to make sure the good stuff and the stuff people are looking for is out there and easy to find."

Comics have always played a role in Johnson's life. He devoured the classics like Richie Rich and Archie as a kid before graduating to crime fighters and superheroes.

His interests eventually led to conventions and selling his own work. A shop was the next logical step.

in the '50s," he says. "Mom would help with food prep in the shop. She has a photographic memory and taught us all the recipes before we opened."

One recipe Ho holds close to his heart is for their kalua pork.

'Traditionally, the whole pig is cooked underground with lava rock and ti leaves in an imu (underground oven) to get that earthy flavor," he says. "My mom taught me how to mimic the imu in the oven using banana leaves and other ingredients."

It's traditions like these that he hopes to pass on to his own family.

"My youngest daughter just told me recently she'd be too sad if Ohana ever closes," Ho says. "She wants to carry it on."



# Leash laws help keep community safe

In Multnomah County, your dog must be on a leash when you are outside your home or fenced yard. The leash should be less than 8 feet long, and under the "control of a capable person." If your dog is allowed to roam "at large" (without leash, fence, gate, etc.) you could be fined. According to Multnomah County law (https://multco.us/county-attorney/multnomah-county-code):

"Allowing a dog to be at-large is a Class C Infraction, which carries a fine of up to \$150 for the first offense and may increase with each instance."

This law is basic urban dog safety, yet it is sometimes disobeyed by novice dog owners who have not thoroughly learned dog behavior and handling. Dogs react differently in different situations, at times surprising their owners.

The correct approach is to prepare for any contingency by keeping the safety of dogs and people foremost. Keeping your dog leashed is not only the law, it is also a

community safety issue.

Dangerous interactions occur when an owner is not aware of or disregards their dog's past behavior. If your dog bites someone or another dog you could be held liable, although Oregon has a one "free bite" precedent.

Have you ever been in a situation where a peaceful walk is traumatized by an off-leash dog rushing you and your pet? Is your dog reactive to other dogs, yet a neighbor allows their dog to approach yours with the comment, "Oh, Rover is fine with other dogs."

The internet is full of suggestions if you find yourself in a dangerous situation. You may give yourself time to escape by tossing treats toward a strange dog or popping open an umbrella in the approaching dog's direction. However, there is no one-size-fits-all answer. Each situation is different.



Be prepared to respond calmly and quickly to protect yourself and your dog. Be vigilant and avoid dogs if they are off leash. If you have a potentially dangerous dog in your neighborhood, you may submit an Animal Nuisance Complaint form with Multnomah County Animal Control.

Keeping you and your dog safe is a fulltime job. It's helpful to get to know your neighborhood, your neighbors and their dogs. Stick to routes you know are safe and avoid dogs that are off leash.

If your dog or you are attacked by another dog, call 911 immediately.
